Rules Corner


We're getting into the wettest part of winter and the course presents a few more challenges, namely Temporary Water and Embedded Balls and players rightly receive **free** relief from both.

Temporary Water – this is any accumulation of water on the surface of the ground [not in a penalty area] and is visible **before or after** the player takes his stance [without jumping up and down]

It's not enough for the ground to be merely wet, muddy or soft and mushy. There has to be an accumulation of water that remains present.

When is relief allowed? Interference exists if a player's ball rests in temporary water or the condition interferes with player's stance or swing. No relief from temporary water on the line of play except on the putting green.

- 1) To take relief from temporary water in the general area, the player needs to identify the nearest point of complete relief and drop a ball within one club length of the spot no nearer the hole [the ball must remain within the relief area]
- 2) On the putting green the player simply places a ball at the nearest point of complete relief.
- 3) In a bunker the nearest point of complete relief must be in the bunker. If there is no such point of complete relief in the bunker, then the player may take maximum available relief or for a penalty of one stroke take relief outside the bunker back-on-the-line.

Rules Corner [cont]



Embedded Ball - An embedded ball is when a player's ball is in its own pitch-mark made as a result of the player's previous stroke and a part of the ball must be below ground level. A ball driven into soft ground without being airborne is not an embedded ball e.g. on a steep bank a player tops the ball badly and drives it into the ground.

Free relief is only permitted when the ball is embedded in the general area i.e. anywhere on the course, other than in a penalty area or bunker or the putting green (of the hole being played).

- 1) The free relief area for an embedded ball must be in the general area. The reference point for taking free relief is right behind where the ball is embedded and the relief area is one club length from the reference point [no nearer the hole]. A ball then dropped must stay in the relief area.
- 2) If the ball is embedded on the putting green, there is no relief procedure as above, the ball may be marked, lifted and cleaned, the impact spot repaired, and the ball replaced on its original spot.
- 3) If the ball is embedded in a bunker, you are only entitled to penalty relief [unplayable] and the ball must be dropped in the bunker alternatively a player may drop outside the bunker however another penalty stroke will be incurred.
- 4) All teeing areas and greens for holes that are not currently being played, are deemed part of the general area
- 5) If a player's ball is embedded in a penalty area the player simply takes penalty relief under the Penalty Areas rule.
